

Staff Changes at ECS



ANN GOEDKOOP joined the Society this past June as the Assistant Director of Publications.

Reporting to Mary Yess, ECS Deputy Executive Director, Ann will assist in the overall management of the Society's publication program. Her primary function will be the management of the production of the *Journal*, *Letters*, and the ECS books program. In addition, Ann will assist in the strategic planning and marketing activities for all the publications.

She will have regular contact with editors, authors, and Society members, as well as printers and other service providers. You may expect to see Ann providing support at Society conferences.

Ann is a graduate of Cook College, Rutgers University with a BA in anthropology. She has also taken continuing education classes in graphic arts at the Rhode Island School of Design.

Ann began her career as a typesetter and now has over 20 years experience in publishing production. While working for a major academic book typographer, Ann developed and implemented operating procedures for its overseas division located in Barbados, West Indies. She made the transition to desktop publishing in the 1990s and is very interested in keeping up with the ever-changing world of publishing.

Most recently, Ann worked in Rhode Island for Cherry Semiconductor, later acquired by ON Semiconductor. Ann was the Technical Publications Production Manager and was responsible for the production of their technical literature and sales/marketing collateral.

Ann worked as the Newsletter Manager at the IEEE before she moved to Rhode Island. In that position, Ann worked closely with volunteer editors of various societies of IEEE and departments within IEEE. She helped produce over 20 quarterly or bimonthly newsletters. Her experience at the IEEE gave Ann a chance to work in the kind of technical publishing environment she enjoys as well as an opportunity to learn the workings of a professional society.

Ann's passions include cooking, art and music, and creative endeavors. She spends her spare time sewing and quilting, hiking and bird watching, and shopping and antiquing. PAUL COOPER, Ann Goedkoop's predecessor, has moved to the Washington, DC area, but will continue to work for ECS on a part-time basis. His new title is Journals Systems Manager and he will be the main support staff for ECS on the PXP system used for the ECS journals.

Paul joined the Society in 1991, and began by styling manuscripts for the *Journal* and handling the production of the pro-

ceedings volumes. From 1992-1997, Paul was asked to undertake the production and advertising work for the then-new members' magazine, *Interface*. Paul was the lead production staff on the launch of the Society's rapid-publication online journal, *Electrochemical and Solid-State Letters*.

In 2000, Paul was promoted to the position of Production Manager for the journals. During 2003 and 2004, he helped to shepherd the implementation at ECS of Peer X-Press (PXP), the online manuscript submission, peer review, and tracking tool for the ECS journals. At the end of 2003, Paul was named the Assistant Director of Publications, continuing in his role as production manager of the journals, but also beginning to take on many other areas of responsibility within the publications department.

"We're very happy to have Paul continue working on the ECS publications," said ECS Deputy Executive Director Mary Yess. "Paul was a more-than-able Assistant Director of Publications and we are fortunate to be able to take advantage of his knowledge and skills."

ELLEN TIANO, the Society's Director of Membership, joined the ECS staff in 1978 as a member of the accounting department. Soon after Ellen joined, the Society began a series of moves that enabled the computerization of many of the administrative functions of ECS, including the membership and subscription records, and the biannual meeting programming. By 1993, as Information Systems Manager, Ellen oversaw the installation of the Society's local area network, enabling the staff to work even more efficiently.

Over the years, Ellen's responsibilities became more wide-ranging to include management of the ECS Sections, the Divisional election records, and the Society's committee records. Ellen was also the staff representative to the Society's Ways and Means Committee, and as such, provided support in the implementation of changes to the Society's bylaws and constitution. In 1994, Ellen became the Director of Membership and Administration.

Ellen relocated to Florida this past June, but will continue working for the Society on a part-time basis, with continued responsibility for the Society's membership activities. "Having been with the Society for so long," said Roque Calvo, ECS Executive Director, "Ellen is a very valuable source of information about many of the Society's current policies and procedures, and we're pleased to have her continue with us."



CAROLYN ZANNONI joined The Electrochemical Society staff in June. Her primary role is Administrative Assistant to Roque Calvo, the Executive Director. Carolyn will also provide support for the activities of the Board of Directors, Division chairs, and Section officers, and will also assist in the overall membership administration process.
