ECS Affiliates

Through the Contributing Membership, advertising, and Technical Exhibitions programs, businesses, corporations, and other organizations have long had an opportunity to become involved with and support ECS and its activities. The ECS Affiliates initiative allows the Society to promote these programs, individually, and as a comprehensive and coordinated set of opportunities. This enables the Society to offer prospective Affiliates a wider range of choices, and for those already involved with ECS, a chance to extend their participation. A new brochure describing the ECS Affiliates program is now available.

Why Affiliation is Beneficial

Compared with other organizations of comparable size and scope, ECS provides Affiliates with a valuable return on their investment. That investment continues to pay dividends as Affiliates take advantage of special offers and discounts. Affiliates also have the satisfaction of knowing that their investment helps fund student programs and underwrite special projects for the Society. Thanks to this new program, Affiliates will find it easier to deliver their message to hard-to-reach markets world-wide, and to decision-makers and actual purchasers of the products and services.

Opportunities for Affiliates

Once a company or organization participates in any of three areas — Advertising, Exhibiting, or Contributing Membership — it automatically becomes an Affiliate. From then on, new opportunities are waiting. Among the most popular choices in the area of advertising is *Interface*. Received by all members of the ECS, as well as subscribed to by institutions, this publication has readers in over 70 countries around the world. *Interface* advertisers, at selected contract rate levels, automatically become eligible for other advertising opportunities and benefits through the ECS Affiliates program. Here's one example: Advertisers who contract at the four-time, black-and-white rate (two-page spread, inside front cover, or full page) can choose between:

ECS Meetings provide a forum for the exchange of information on the latest scientific and technical developments in the fields ECS covers. Each meeting serves as a major conference for the discussion of interdisciplinary research from around the world through a variety of formats. Technical Exhibitions are held in conjunction with each semiannual international meeting held in spectacular venues around the world.
